




AFP in West Africa

Overview

- Focused on both the FP2020 and Ouagadougou commitments
- AFP to work intensively in Burkina Faso and Senegal
- Other Francophone countries eligible and encouraged to apply to the Opportunity Fund
- Futures Group International—lead partner and liaison with AFP-Baltimore, with aim to maximize resources of AFP and the Health Policy Project








The Ouagadougou Commitment

Seven commitments—Let's focus on 4-7

- 4. 30% increase in the number of health professionals, trained and authorized to provide the entire package of family planning services and reproductive health
- 5. Annual increases in the national budget contribution for contraceptives
- 6. M&E of actions to reduce maternal mortality and unmet need in for family planning family by at least 25% for all Francophone West Africa
- 7. Increased institutional level of family planning within government structures







FP2020 Commitments

Senegal



Via Minister of Health Coll-Seck, the government pledges to:

- Make family planning a national top priority
- Increase the commodity budget from the government by 200%
- Double the budget for family planning program management
- Introduce innovative approaches—e.g. Sayana Press

Burkina Faso

Via the First Lady, the government pledges to:

- Maintain family planning as a central priority of development policies, effectively enforce existing legal instruments on reproductive health and reduce contraceptive commodity costs
- Increase allocations for family planning in state budgets and establish regular and active monitoring of contraceptive commodity availability







2013 Advocacy Priorities—Senegal Improve the policy environment—Task-shifting

- Increase community-level access to pills, injectables, and long-acting methods via community health workers, pharmacies and matronnes
- Diffuse WHO guidance on task-shifting for family planning; compile relevant evidence in Senegal and advocate for French translation of guidance

Increase resources for family planning

- Hold government accountable; tracking allocations and expenditures for contraceptive supplies
- Increase the support of mayors to allocate their own funds for family planning
- Diffuse the Reproductive Health Law through translation in local languages








Advocacy Priorities–Burkina Faso

Improve the policy environment—Task-shifting

- Increase community-level access to pills, injectables, and long-acting methods via community health workers, pharmacies, others
- Diffuse WHO guidance on task-shifting

Increase resources for family planning

- Hold government accountable; tracking allocations and expenditures for contraceptive supplies
- Explore public and private-sector opportunities for supporting cost reductions for contraceptive commodities
